Additionally, students will develop skills in interpreting biblical texts and teachings to deepen their understanding of Christian beliefs and practices. Students will also examine Christian teachings about the afterlife and develop their ability to evaluate religious arguments using evidence and reasoned judgment. They will reflect on spiritual and philosophical questions, apply Christian teachings to contemporary moral dilemmas, and explore how Christian beliefs influence individual behaviour and decision-making in real-life situations.
